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GUICH FACTS

20% of the Canadian homeless population are between the ages 13 - 24

40% of homeless youth in Canada will have first experienced homelessness before the age of 16


1 in 5 shelter users in Canada are youth

Of the 40,000 homeless youth in Canada, 6000 -7000 will be seeking safe shelter tonight

EFFECTS OF HOMELESSNESS

GRADES

- 40% of school-aged children that are homeless have to repeat a grade at least once or more (Murran, et al., 2022)
- 37% of these children have grades falling below the average (Murran, et al., 2022)



DEVELOPMENTAL DELAY

 A study of a cohort of homeless children in Paris showed that 80.9% of these children showed some degree of developmental delay (D'Sa, et al., 2020)



ABSENTS

- Less than 38% of homeless school-aged children attend school everyday (Murran, et al., 2022)
- 23% of them go to school half the time or more (Murran, et al., 2022)



EFFECTS OF FOOD INSECURITY

- Poor nutrition can lead to poor academic performance as well as slower cognitive development (Cassar, 2022)
- A study conducted in three schools observed how students responded to two different types of lunch programs (Cassar, 2022)
 - Traditional lunch services (TLS)
 - Fresh and Healthy Program (F&H)

FRESH&HEALTHY PROGRAM


Food items include:

- Salads


How did students respond to the F&H meals?
